


Evictions – Tenant Information

If you receive an eviction notice stating that you have the right to contest the notice by filing an Affidavit (answer) with the justice court, and you wish the court to know that you are **not** in default of payment of the rent or in violation of the lease, etc., you must file the appropriate forms with the court. It is important to read the notice carefully and note any important deadlines for responding/answering. FILING FEES: If you cannot afford filing fees, you must prepare a Fee Waiver Application (Application to Proceed *In Forma Pauperis*). If the Fee Waiver is granted by the judge, the documents will be filed. If the Fee Waiver is denied, you will have two business days to pay the fee or the Affidavit (answer) will not be filed. **Note:** *Once a Fee Waiver Application has been denied on a case by the Judge, the tenant cannot submit another Fee Waiver Application. The tenant must pay the fees at the time of filing the documents.*

If the notice tells you to take action in **10 days or less (as nearly all eviction notices will)**, it is referring to judicial days. A judicial day does not include:

- a. The day of service;
- b. Weekends
- c. Legal Holidays

If the notice tells you to take action in **11 days or more (for example, a 30-day “no cause” notice)**, you count calendar days. That is, you do not count the day of service but you do count weekends and legal holidays.

3 additional days are added if the notice is mailed.
